SCHEME OF EXAMINATION: 2021

Each Theory Paper. **Duration** 3 hrs **Marks** 100
Dissertation/Thesis/Survey Report/Field work, if any Marks 100

1. The number of papers and the maximum marks for each paper/practical shall be shown in the syllabus for the subject concerned. It will be necessary for a candidate to pass the theory as well as the practicals (wherever prescribed) of a subject/paper separately.

2. A candidate to pass in each of the Previous and the Final Examination must need to obtain (i) at least 36% marks in the aggregate of all the papers prescribed for the examination and (ii) at least 36% marks in practical (s) wherever prescribed at the examination, provided that if a candidate fails to secure at least 25% marks in each individual paper work, at the examination and also in the dissertation/report/field work. Wherever prescribed, he shall be deemed to have failed at the examination if he is not able to obtain the minimum percentage of marks required in the aggregate for that examination. No division will be awarded for the Previous Examination. Division will be awarded at the end of the Final Examination on the basis of the combined marks obtained in the Previous and the Final Examination taken together, 3. Division will be according the following format:

First Division 60%

Second Division 48%

(to calculate the percentage of the student the aggregate marks taken together of the Previous and Final Examination will be considered.) All the rest of the candidates will be declared to have passed the examinations.

1- If a candidate clears any Paper(s) Practical(s)/Dissertation prescribed at the Previous and/or Final Examination after a continuous period of three years, then for the purpose of working out his division the minimum pass marks only viz. 25% (36% in the case of practical) shall be taken into account in respect of such Paper(s)/Practical(s)/Dissertation are cleared after the expiry of the aforesaid period of three years provided that in case where a candidate requires more than 25% marks in order to reach the minimum aggregate as many mark out of those actually secured by him will be taken into account as would enable him to make up the deficiency in the requisite minimum aggregate.

2- The Thesis/Dissertation/Survey Report/Field Work shall be typed and written and submitted in triplicate so as to reach the office of the Registrar at least 3 weeks before the commencement of the theory examinations. Only those candidates shall be permitted to offer Dissertation/ Field work/Survey Report/ Thesis (if provided in the scheme of examination) in lieu of a paper as have secured at least 55% marks in the aggregate of all the papers prescribed for the previous examination in the case of annual scheme irrespective of the number of papers in which a candidate actually appeared at the examination.

3- A candidate failing at M.A. Previous examination may be provisionally admitted to the M.A. Final Class, provided that he passes in at least 50% papers as per Provisions of 0.235

4- A candidate may be allowed grace marks in only one theory papers up to the extent of 1% of the total marks prescribed for that examination.

N.B. :-

(i) Non-collegiate candidates are not eligible to offer dissertation as per provisions of O. 170-A.

Time : 10 hours, Four session of 2½ hours each in two consecutive day. Two sittings every day with a break of 1 hour in between. The Examiner will send in the instructions paper to the Principal to be opened 24 hours before the fixed date of examination, in which he or she will clearly explain the model, background etc. The principal will open the instruction paper and hand it over to the head of the department, so that he or she can make arrangements for the same. Examiners should reach the centre before the commencement of the exams. If not possible external examiner can come on the day for assessment of the work.

Medium : Oil Colour or Water Colour

Paper B - Landscape Painting

Max. 80 Marks

Min. 29 Marks

Time : 10 Hours, Four Sessions of 2½ hours each in two consecutive days. Two sittings every day with a break of 1 hour in between. Landscape painting on sight in oil or water colour with proper handling of medium and perspective Landscapes of Lanes, Cityscapes. Skyscrapers and Hills capes should be painted. Study of bridges, lakes and group of tree with special effects of environment and also effects of light & shadows. The Examiner should reach at the centre at least one hour before commencement of exam .The complete exam should be conducted on the spot. External examiner is free to come on the next day for assessment.

Size of the Paper ½ imperial

Medium - Oil Colour or Water Colour

OR

Paper C - Graphics (Collagraph Etching, lino, woodcut)

Max. 80 Marks

Min. 29 Marks

Size of the graphic should not exceed 10"x8" / 25 x 20 cm.

Time : 10 Hours , Four sessions of 2½ hours each in two consecutive days. Two sittings every day with a break of 1 hour in between. Examiner should reach the centre before the commencement of the Examination. External examiner and Internal examiner will prepare the question paper, which will include five topics from daily life. Candidates will choose one topic from the choice of 5 and prepare a lay-out on given drawing sheet in Black and white colour and submit it to the examiner in the first sitting In the Second sitting the candidates will submit their preliminary sketches and block with the final prints. External examiner can come on the next to assess the examination work .

Submission of work

Max. 40 Marks

Min. 15 Marks

Every candidate will have to submit the following work one month before the commencement of the Annual Examination.

(i) 10 submission of each practical paper offered completed either in oil colour or water colour.

Size : About ½ Imp. or larger.

(ii) Paper A Submission: the candidate will submit 5 plates of portrait in monochrome colour. Students must study the Portraits from live models.

(iii) Installation will done by students. These installations will be done by the students anytime during the session before the commencement of the final practical. These works cannot be preserved for a longer period so students will submit documentation (text & photographs or audio visual documents) regarding their works. These works will be evaluated for the final exams. Students who will opt for paper (B) or paper (C) will submit a Installation.

(iv) A Sketch - book containing not less than 50 (sketches) paper. Pencil or colour sketches of human, animal figure. Study of trees, lanes, huts, rocks, hills & human faces.

Size : ¼ Imperial

(v) Marking distribution submission

Paper (A) Portrait – 10 marks, Paper (B) Landscape or Paper (C) Graphics - 10 Marks, Installation – 10 marks and sketching – 10 marks.

Marks on the submitted work will be awarded internally by the Head of the Department of Drawing and Painting with the consent of the concerning teacher. In case of any dispute the decision of the HOD will be final. The work of the candidate will be retained by the HOD for one month after the declaration of result and then returned to the candidate. Examination answer sheets (Paintings) will be retained in the department and will be preserved at least for twelve months after the declaration of result. These will not be returned to the candidates.

General Instructions :

Note:

(a) Candidate should pass in practical as well as in theory papers separately.

(b) Practical Examinations should be arranged one month before the commencement of theory examination.

(c) There should be 8 periods for each practical and 4 periods for each theory paper and 2 periods for sketching in a week (each period of 1 hour).

(d) The practical answer books shall be examined by one external and one internal examiner to be appointed on the recommendation of the Head of the Department as per existing practice.

15 hours in 6 sittings of 2½ hours each in 3 consecutive days. Two sitting every day with a break of 1 hour in between.

Size of the paper : Imperial size.

Medium : Oil colour or water colour

Note: The External Examiner will send practical Question papers along with direction before Commencement of practical examination. The internal examiner and the External practical examiner will evaluate the practical work on the last day practical examination.

Paper E - Graphic (Etching or Litho or Serigraph)

Max. 80 Marks

Min. 29 Marks

Duration :

15 hours 6 sitting of 2½ hours each on 3 consecutive days. Two sittings every day with break of 1 hour in between.

Size of the Graphic Should not exceed 10" x 8"/25x20 cms.

Candidate will submit their preliminary Sketches and block along with the final prints.

OR

Paper F - Composition (Pictorial)

Duration :

15 hours , 6 sittings of 2½ hours each in 3 consecutive days. Two sittings every day with a break of 1 hour in between.

Size of the paper: Imperial size.

Medium : Oil, Water color or tempera.

Students will submit eight compositions (paintings) & two relief mural. Relief mural should be done by any media like paper mache, ceramics, any mineral powder with adhesive, metal sheet, Iron and wire, wood, fiberglass or any type of plastic material etc. A student focus on his composition with semi figurative style and abstract forms. Size of the mural should not less then 20" x 30".

Note : The external Examiner will send Practical papers along with directions before commencement of practical examination. The Internal Examiner will evaluate the practical work on the last day of practical examination.

Submission of Work :

Max. 40 Marks Min. 15 Marks

Each candidate will have to submit the following work one month before the commencement of the annual examination (Final)

(i) 10 Submission of each practical papers offered should be executed either in oil colour or water colour & 5 plates of life study in charcoal

Size near about full imperial or larger.

(ii) Eight original composition based on different modern trends on Imperial Size paper or Canvas and two works of Relief mural.

(iii) A project of almost fifty pages shall be prepared by each student of M.A. Final on the topics such as Indian Art/ Art work/ Painters as submission work. This submission will be of 10 marks.

(iv) Relief mural should be done by any media like paper mache, ceramics, any mineral powder with adhesive, metal sheet, Iron and wire, wood, fiberglass or any type of plastic material etc. A student focus on his composition with semi figurative style and abstract forms. Size of the mural should not less then 20" x 30".

(v) A Sketch book containing not less than 50 pencil or colour sketches. group of human, animals figures, huts, lanes, group trees and creative sketches. 5 prints of graphics (woodcut, lino or collagraph)

Size : ¼ Imperial

(vi) Marking distribution for submission

Paper (D) Study from life – 10 marks, Paper (E) Graphics or Paper (F) Composition – 10 marks, Project – 10 marks and Sketching – 10 marks.

Marks on the submission work will be awarded internally by the head of the department of Drawing & Painting with the consent of the concerning teacher. In case of any dispute the decision of the HOD will be final. The work of the candidate will be retained by the HOD for one month after the declaration of the result and then returned to the candidate.

General Instruction:

(a) Candidate should pass practicals as well as theory paper separately.

(b) Practical Examination should be arranged one month before the commencement of theory examinations.

Examination answer sheets will be retained in the department and will be preserved at least for twelve months after the declaration of result. These sheets will not be returned to the candidates.

(c) There should be 8 periods for each practical and 4 periods for each theory paper plus 2 periods for sketching in a week.

(d) The practical answer books shall be examined by one external and one internal examiner to be appointed on the recommendation of the Head of the department as per existing practice.

(e) The department should also arrange for an educational tour to ancient and modern art centers like Ajanta, Ellora, Elephanta, Khajuraho, Mahabalipuram, National gallery of Modern Art & museums, Exhibitions, Modern Art Galleries, Art College and places suitable for outdoor sketching.
